ACADEMIC CALENDAR:

Fall (blocks 1 and 2)

Exchange option 1: end of Aug – end Dec

Spring (blocks 3, 4 and 5)

Exchange option 2: early Jan – mid-June
Exchange option 3: early Jan – mid-April
Exchange option 4: early Feb – mid-June
Exchange option 5: early Feb – mid-April

In general, exams are scheduled the week after or at the end of each block. The re-sits, however, take place in December (block 1), February (block 2), March/April (block 3), June (block 4), July (block 5). Minor (block 1) re-sits take place in July.

LEARNING EXPECTATIONS:

Teaching Language	English
Duration	Students are expected to complete their entire exchange programme at RSM including final exams. Neither exemptions nor special arrangements with teaching staff can be made to schedule exams or re-sits on other dates, times, or places.
Introduction	At the start of each full-term programme, introduction activities are being organized. Exchange students are strongly recommended to participate in order not to miss out on important programme information and it is THE day to meet all fellow students.
Workload	Courses are denominated in EC (European Credits). The workload of one academic year is 60 EC. One EC is the equivalent of 28 hours (including in-class hours, self-study, group work, writing papers and exam preparation). A 10 EC course has approximately 12 contact hours a week. For exchange students, the minimum workload is 20 EC for the fall term and 13 to 20 EC for the spring term (differs per period) and a maximum of 30 EC for the fall term and 30 EC for the spring term applies.
Examinations	The assessment of the performance of students varies; written or take-home exams, progress reports, in-class presentations, group performance and essays.
Grading	The Dutch grading system uses grades 1 to 10, with 1 being the lowest and 10 the highest. Grades are generally given to one decimal place. Grades with a 0.4 or lower will be rounded down, and grades with a 0.5 or more will be rounded up. Transcripts from students in our exchange programmes will show grades to 1 decimal place. CURRICULUM:	
Courses at RSM	Undergraduate students from our partner schools participate in our Bachelor Exchange Programme and moreover in courses from our 3-year BSc International Business Administration (IBA) programme. All courses are taught in English, and the curriculum offers a broad approach and options for differentiation, covering all functional areas of business.
Course overview Bachelor 1, 2 & 3	On this page an overview of bachelor 1, 2 and 3rd year courses are given. The majority of these courses are open to exchange students. An overview of the exact course offer is sent to nominated exchange students.
Course manuals	Course manuals are published about two weeks prior to the start of the courses on a platform open to enrolled students.
International Business: The Dutch Way	This course has been specially designed for exchange students to introduce them to the Dutch business environment and its economic and cultural settings. Economic analyses are examined and discussed in the context of European and Dutch cultures. Special attention is given to recent developments in large international companies located in the Netherlands. Students will become familiar with several Dutch companies, each showing a different aspect of doing international business in the Netherlands and will work on assignments for each one. Company visits, assignments in the form of business challenges and linked to guest lectures will be part of this course. This course is offered in spring term only.
Course registration	There are several registration rounds to register for courses. Students will be instructed about 1 week prior to such a registration round.
Courses at other faculties	<p>Only a few other schools/courses are open to exchange students. Every school has its own course registration procedure and deadline, it is therefore the student's own responsibility to register in time for courses and avoid overlap in the timetable of RSM.</p> <p>Arts, Culture & History: History courses International Bachelor Arts and Culture Studies</p> <p>Media & Communication: Media & Communication Courses - Bachelor / Undergraduate level</p> <p>Erasmus School of Social and Behavioral Sciences: ESSB courses for exchange students from other faculties</p> <p>Erasmus School of Economics: Last year, we initiated a trial collaboration with ESE, allowing our students access to 1 ESE course. The evaluation of this initiative is scheduled for this summer. Should the evaluation prove successful and the program continues, we will provide detailed information about the available courses and their prerequisites to nominated students via email.</p>

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Open to	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Third Year (or fourth year) bachelor students from our partner schools. • Students who have been selected by their home university.
English requirement	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • TOEFL (iBT) score of 80+/4.5+; minimum sub score of 18/4.0 for reading & listening, 20/4.0 for speaking and 21/4.5 for writing. • IELTS 6.5; minimum sub score of 6.0 for reading, listening, speaking, and writing. • CEFR level B2 • Cambridge FCE/CAE/CPE/BEC Higher 170; minimum sub score of 170 for reading, listening, speaking & writing. • Pearson PTE score of 70+; minimum sub score of 65+ for reading, listening, speaking, and writing • LanguageCert Academic score of 70+; minimum sub score of 65+ for reading, listening, speaking, and writing • Another English language certificate of a comparable level with comparable (sub)scores. <p>NOTE: we do not accept language statements from universities, unless it is a statement that the entire programme is taught in English</p>
English exemption	Non-native speakers whose current study programme is entirely taught in English and native speakers are exempted from the above-mentioned requirements, though this needs to be shown in your current transcript or any other official document
After nomination at RSM	About a month prior to the student's application deadline, nominated students will receive a Welcome Email with instructions for the online application system, information about visa and residence permit (if applicable), accommodation, academic calendar, and other relevant information to help them prepare. We will also provide an online information session.
Deadline application	<p>It is the student's own responsibility to submit the exchange application in time.</p> <p>Fall: May 15</p> <p>Spring: October 15</p> <p>Late applications will not be dealt with unless agreed upon with the partner school.</p>
Required documents	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Completed RSM online application • 1 digital passport size photo (jpg file) • Scan of a recent official transcript (or academic report) showing grades, from the first year to the latest results • Proof of proficiency in English
Information during and after the application process	<p>Students can check their status in the online application system. Upon approval of the application, students will receive at least 2 other email messages:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) One with information on the course registration including specific information about the courses, timetables, etc. 2) The other with more detailed information on the introduction, arrival in the Netherlands, the Exchange Ambassador Programme, which is also referred to as the 'final Information email'. <p>The Letter of Acceptance is sent to students through the online application system.</p>

Visa/residence permit	Students with a non-EU/EEA nationality might need to obtain an entry visa and/or a residence permit to study in The Netherlands. If applicable, students can indicate this in our application system which will initiate the immigration procedure. Visa requirements are subject to change. Always check: Immigration Erasmus University Rotterdam .
Costs of living	The estimated costs for living and studying in Rotterdam is <u>approximately €1000-1800 a month</u> . These costs include visa and/or residence permit (if applicable), living expenses, health/3d party insurance (mandatory), books, meals & drinks. However, all costs depend on a student's personal spending pattern and therefore costs may vary.
